
Students at the English Language Centre (ELC) Win International Writing Awards

Secondary Students at the English Language Centre (ELC) have received international awards for essays on written about youth, change and the climate crisis in the Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition in 2020.

In the junior category, Chua Kah Yee received a gold award; Melvern Chai Charng Foh, a silver award and Joshua Chong Qi Xiang, a bronze award. In the senior category, Edmund Wong Li Hong obtained a silver award; Janice Mok Zi Xuan and Cherie Choo won bronze awards.

Edmund Wong Li Hong's entry is entitled, "Youth and Change: Dawn of the New Generation." He said this on receiving the award: "Getting an award means your writing meets a certain standard, so it is good to know that my writing has improved over that month of agony. However, this also means there is lots of room for improvement. Even though you receive an award, it does not mean that your quality of writing has reached its peak! ELC students have been entering and winning awards in this competition for over thirty years.
